SAVE HARRIS RIDGE at Radnor Lake State Natural Area



Imagine one of the largest undeveloped properties in Oak Hill sitting on a ridge overlooking Radnor Lake State Natural Area. Now picture those 37 acres of old growth forest being cleared to make way for 18 houses or 5 ridgetop mansions. Fortunately, the Harris family, who has owned this property for decades, agreed to sell to the Friends of Radnor Lake. This will extend the boundary of Radnor Lake and support what Radnor does best—preserve the natural habitat for wildlife and waterfowl forever.

Most visitors to the Lake may be unaware that the area's geology, geography and climate create diverse habitats for a surprising variety of species. According to Dr. Robert Loeb of Penn State, "I have been studying urban woodlands in the eastern United States for 35 years and none come close to Radnor Lake in terms of vegetation diversity, landscape preservation from ongoing disturbance, visual accessibility to wild animals, and awe inspiring beauty."

With an acquisition cost of \$900,000, substantially below market value, Harris Ridge requires the joint efforts of many Friends of Radnor Lake.

FORL is partnering with the State of Tennessee, the Cal Turner Foundation, the Adams Family Foundation and other generous donors to make the financial side of this acquisition work. In order to close on the property in December 2010, FORL put up \$300,000 of its savings. Of course, that is our mission... to raise money and spend it on land and programs. Because we have been on the spending side of the equation, we now need to shift to the fund raising side to be ready to step up to the next big opportunity. For that reason, we ask

for your help to make a difference for generations to come.

The Harris Ridge project has been on our target list for 8 years. At a cost of \$900,000, this purchase was facilitated

by FORL putting up \$300,000 in cash to close the sale.

RADNOR REPORT

Volunteers, Friends of Radnor Lake facilitate trail reopening

Steve Ward knows the value of a friend, or in this case, a loyal group of them.

The Radnor Lake park manager moved into the role as head ranger nine years ago, garnering an instant adoption by the Friends of Radnor Lake and a subsequent connection to a group of individuals who have been the backbone of the state natural area even before its establishment in 1973.

“(The Friends) are my right arm,” Ward said after touring the park’s South Cove trail, which re-opened last week due in large part to the contributions and donated work hours from members of the Friends group and other local volunteers.

The trail was just one area affected by one of the 40 landslides that blanketed the 1,258-acre park after last May’s flood. While the most serious landslide forced the six-week closure of a portion of Otter Creek Road, Ward said the renovation of South Cove and connecting South Lake trail was a turning point in the ongoing recovery effort.

“Our original deadline was December,” Ward said. “Then it was March 1. We really wanted it open for natural areas week (April 10-16), but the spring wildflowers were the big push.”

Although Ward noted South Cove as “the best wildflower viewing,” the path’s new pedestrian bridge is perhaps the best place to spot a four-legged neighbor. The bridge, designed by Architect Chris Magill, and constructed through three months of volunteer hours, connects South Cove and South Lake trails – routes that were originally only linked by a larger encompassing design prior to the flood.

The finished South Cove trail created a horseshoe-shaped loop around the half-acre landslide.

Other volunteer projects included the renovation of nearby Spillway Trail’s observation deck, which was revamped by the Friends group last summer.

Ward said about half of a \$14,000 REI grant has been used to renovate South Cove, along with approximately half of the \$100,000 Forest Hills grant. The ranger also expects to receive \$20,000 in FEMA reimbursement money for man hours and equipment costs. Ward, however, said donations from the Friends group and other supporters were “too many to count.”

With a timely FEMA relief process, four buildings sustaining water damage, 75 fallen trees and the closure of the South Trail and Otter Creek Road, Ward and the five staff rangers didn’t waste any time once the waters subsided last May. Since then, approximately 3,600 volunteers have had a hand in the progress that has cost nearly \$1 million, thus far.

“Our approach from day one was to fix what we could ourselves,” Ward said. “We’ve had attorneys changing their clothes at the office at the end of the work day and coming down here to help at Radnor Lake.”

Despite the optimistic re-opening, Ward said less serious landslides will continue to be a problem for the area, particularly if spring rains become heavy.

“A landslide won’t stop; it’ll slow down,” Ward said. “Eventually the ground will stabilize.”

Relief efforts continue at Radnor Lake, and volunteers can register to help by visiting www.radnorlake.org.

Visitors can walk the trail from 6 a.m. until sunset daily. The visitor center is open from 8:30 a.m.-4 p.m. daily.

Friends of Radnor Lake 11th Annual Environmental Award Ceremony

Friends of Radnor Lake held its 11th Annual Environmental Award Ceremony in early April. This ceremony celebrates individuals who have demonstrated dedication to protecting Radnor Lake.

Ann Tidwell was the recipient of the Friends of Radnor Lake 2011 Environmental Award, which is given to honor those who have contributed to protecting and preserving the natural resources of Radnor Lake. Having served on the Friends' board of directors for more than 25 years, Ann has gone above and beyond for the natural area since the very beginning.

Ann was an early organizer of the "Save Radnor Lake" campaign in 1972 and has remained an active member of Friends of Radnor Lake ever since. Ann's passion for parks and natural areas in Tennessee is unmistakable. She was quick to acknowledge the contributions of others in helping the development of the natural area. "We went out and got support from neighbors in the area and had meetings in their houses and figured out a way to save the lake. Many of those people still contribute to the lake today," Ann said.

The City of Forest Hills was the recipient of the 2011 Friends of Radnor Lake Partnership Award. This award is given to a group or organization that has shown exceptional support for Radnor Lake. The City of Forest Hills graciously donated \$100,000 to Radnor Lake for the rebuilding efforts after the floods that occurred in May 2010.

"If not for Forest Hills' leadership, we would not be in the condition we are today," said Charley Hankla, president of FORL. As of April, the trails in the natural area have been fully restored, less than a year later, thanks to Forest Hills and all of the volunteers who gave their time to assist in the recovery.

Friends of Radnor Lake recognized park manager Steve Ward with the Blue Heron Award. This very special distinction is given to recognize the highest level of support toward preserving the natural area. The award carries the name of the blue heron because the

heron's presence is a clear indication that an area is a hospitable environment for wildlife.

The award came as a surprise to Steve, and as board member Paul Buchanan said with some degree of roast and some degree of truth, "Steve Wards sleeps 2 hours a night, and spends the rest of his 24/7 going the extra mile to make sure that everything possible is done to restore

the damage caused by the flood and protect the natural area."

"The goal is to get back to being a natural area, and that's what we are going to do," Steve said after receiving the award. When presenting the award to Steve, Hankla noted that many reports expected Otter Creek Road to remain closed for more than a year following the flood. Steve had the road open in 37 days.



South Central Historical Archeology Conference

November 12-14, 2010

In November of 2010, The South Central Historical Archeology Conference (SCHAC) was hosted by RLSNA, Friends of Radnor Lake, MTSU's History Department, College of Liberal Arts, and Global Studies.

Since Spring of 2006, MTSU Department of Geosciences' Geography students have been conducting geohistorical archeological research at RLSNA. Led by Dr. Douglas Heffington (a former professor of park manager Steve Ward) they have been studying early human settlement patterns as they relate to the geography of the Radnor Lake area. At this time it was a natural fit to host the SCHAC conference to share this information. More information about this project is available at http://www.radnorlake.org/geography_class.html. Indeed, Radnor Lake itself is the result of an historic event. It was created in 1914 by the L & N Railroad when they dammed Otter Creek to create a water supply for the railroad.

The conference began on Friday evening with a delightful reception. President Charley Hankla greeted us with great enthusiasm along with RLSNA staff. A presentation about the Land Trust for Tennessee was given. Conference participants were pleased to hear about this, and amazed at the things that have been accomplished by the Land Trust.

Saturday morning we assembled at the visitor center. We were warmly greeted by Friends Vice-president Greer Tidwell. Radnor staff was on hand to help in many ways, answering questions and enjoying these visitors who had brought a different perspective to the area.

Saturday was devoted to papers concerning historical archeology in the South Central region of the US. Current historical research at Radnor Lake was discussed by RLSNA staff members and others. Tennessee projects discussed included "Finding Fort Pickering: Civil War Archaeology on the South Bluff in Memphis" by Guy Weaver. "GPS and GIS: Tools to Map Historic Cemeteries in Rutherford Co. TN" was presented by Bethany Hall. Another fascinating paper was "Shake Rag: Current Research of an Abandoned Coal Town in Marion Co. TN" by Jaime Woodcock.

Leslie C. "Skip" Stewart-Abernathy from the Arkansas Archeological Survey and a founding father of SCHAC discussed "The Power of Things: Some Historical Archeology of Antebellum Arkansas". For a complete list of papers go to

Sunday morning Steve Ward and Doug Heffington led us on a hike to several historic sites in RLSNA. These included "the wonderful barn" on the Hall tract and a cemetery in the eastern part of the park. We also explored the archives and lab in the education building. The knowledge and enthusiasm of Steve and

Doug was simply wonderful. All participants felt their love, understanding and concern for the future of the area. After our walk, Michael T. Gavin from MTSU discussed "The Log Houses of Middle Tennessee".

It was a pleasure for me to learn of this historic aspect of RLSNA which is being studied. I also enjoyed visiting with friends from Louisiana, Arkansas, and Mississippi and sharing this beautiful natural area with them. Many thanks to FORL, MTSU and the Radnor Lake staff for providing an excellent experience for the visiting archeologists. This is a remarkable place. Because of the SCHAC conference I have become aware of one more fascinating aspect of Radnor Lake State Natural Area.

Reptile Exhibits Updated

Snakes are the highlight of the Visitor Center. People of all ages are drawn to them, whether they have an affinity for them or not. When the Rangers do programs, having a snake available for people to touch and see ensures a group's oohs and aahs.

In November 2010, Park Manager Steve Ward asked me to take charge of upgrading the displays in the Visitor Center and Education Center. The plan was to create more professional looking displays and to ensure the health and safety of the five snakes currently living at RLSNA.

The Pine Snake and King-snake had outgrown their cages and needed space to accommodate their lengthening sizes. They now live in larger custom made enclosures in the corner displays of the Visitor Center. They are the focal point of

the entire room with digital displays scrolling educational information about Radnor's snakes.

The Cornsnake is advanced in age and needed a home away from the main visitation to reduce stress associated with constant contact. Our two venomous snakes, the Copperhead and the Timber Rattlesnake, needed more secure homes to keep them safe. Each of them now lives in new 180 gallon enclosures at the Education Center. Imagen,

LLC. helped design the educational display and aesthetic aspects. Glasscages.com made the enclosures. Robin Conover donated the background photographs.

Two brochures will be available in the Visitor Center, one for reptiles and one for amphibians. With these upgrades and additions, Radnor Lake's educational program has taken a significant step forward. By educating park visitors, we can all better protect these often misunderstood but truly important creatures. Thank you to the Barbara J. Mapp Foundation whose primary focus is "to protect and preserve animals and their habitat and to promote the interaction between humans and animals" and to those caring people who donated funds to this project. Radnor is a better place because of your efforts!

An added bonus of the reptile exhibit upgrade

Stream Cleaning

When the Great Nashville Flood swept through Radnor Lake last May, it left a mess that stretched into the most remote regions of the 1,200 acre park. On a chilly Saturday in April and again in May, two groups of hardy volunteers trekked into the wild to continue the more subtle aspects of an ongoing cleanup.

Led by Rangers Ryan Jenkins & Leslie Anne Rawlings, as well as former Junior Ranger Jason Bird, the volunteer group consisted of Belmont University students, Hands On Nashville volunteers and those volunteers that Radnor counts on throughout the year. Working in the eastern area of the park, the volunteers tackled trash and debris that had clogged Otter Creek and threatened to float into the lake.



The project was underwritten by Together Green, the environmental initiative funded by Toyota through the Audubon Society, with the assistance of the Friends of Radnor Lake.

When the volunteers first slogged into the target area, the problem was obvious: trash from the flood had piled up where the creek flowed onto the Radnor property, along with 100 feet of rusty barbed wire. In stark contrast nearby were rare pennywort plants and old trees rising from a natural bog.

After four hours, the debris was scooped into 40 trash bags, and the barbed wire was removed. It was another successful volunteer effort in a string of projects that have helped repair and protect the park.

The volunteers celebrated afterward with sub sandwiches and oranges at the Visitor Center — lunch was coordinated by Friends of Radnor Lake.
